TRAVELLING TO THE FAROE ISLANDS

What, where, when - and why

For the first time ever, the Copenhagen Fellowship is travelling to the Faroe Islands! The purpose of the trip is to not only *talk about* but also *talk with* the people of the Islands, and especially let them *talk for themselves*.

We want to ensure representation of views, traditions, experiences, perspectives, and local voices. We want to engage with, expand, learn, inspire and be inspired. We want to create and strengthen a network across the North Atlantic - and beyond.

WHEN

We will be travelling for the third week of the 2021 Copenhagen Fellowship, from August 23 - August 29, 2021.

WHERE

Located between Norway and Iceland, the Faroe Islands is a selfgoverning archipelago in the Kingdom of Denmark.

WHAT

In cooperation with local nongovernment and other organizations in the Faroe Islands, the 2021 Copenhagen Fellowship will visit the Faroe Islands and examine the idea of the "Unity of the Realm" from a Faroese perspective. During our stay we will meet with politicians, journalists, artists, activists, and experts. We will explore the nature and the food, and we will spend two days engaging with a group of young Faroese students and activist.

WHY

Because it is important to make sure that the debates undertaken by the Cph Fellowship are locally anchored, to expand our horizons, to give voice to the people of the North Atlantic, to understand the perspectives and the lived lives and truths of those affected by history and decisions made far from their home, in the capitol of Copenhagen. To not talk *about* but also talk *with*, to engage in dialogue and strengthen the democratic conversation.

TIME ZONE WEST

The Faroe Islands is located in time zone WEST (Western European Summer Time): UTC +1, i.e. the Faroes are 1 hour behind Danish time (CEST).

THE WEATHER

The weather in the Faroe Islands in August is usually cloudy and with temperature of around 10-15 degrees Celsius. We recommend you bring a jacket and some light layers. There is also a high probability that it will rain, so pack accordingly!

THE LANGUAGE

The national and official language of the Faroe Islands is *Faroese*. The language is spoken only by approximately 75,000 - 80,000 people throughout the world. The Faroese language is one of the most important aspects of Faroese culture and identity. The Faroese people are conscious of the need to preserve their language by keeping it resilient in the face of global influences.

Faroese is a Nordic language, which derives from the language of the Norsemen who settled the Faroe Islands in the viking age, (Old Norse was the language spoken by the Vikings).

The Faroese language is closely related to Icelandic, Norwegian, Danish and Swedish.

YES! WE WILL GO ON A HIKE!

On Wednesday we will be going on a hike. It's classified as an 'easy' hike (by Faroese standards). It will take us from Tórshavn to Kirkjubø and takes 2-3 hours (7 km.). Height: 100 m - 230 m.

Kirkjubø is a village on the island of Streymoy. The village is the Faroes' most important historical site, with the ruins of the Magnus Cathedral from around 1300, Saint Olav's Church from the 12th century and the old farmhouse of Kirkjubøargarður from the 11th century. In Kirkjebø we will have a guided tour of the old church and farmhouse by the farmer Jóannes Patursson (descendent of the wellknown nationalist of the same name).

Bring sensible clothing. Clothes may be dirty and wet. And it may rain. Be sure to bring a water proof jacket and sturdy walking shoes!

FØROYA FÓLKAHÁSKÚLI -Staying at a folk high School

For the dureation of our stay we will be staying at the *Föroya Fólkaháskúli* (the Faroese Folk High School) in Tórshavn. The Folk High School focuses on dance, theatre, and the arts and take students from all over the world for their programs. During our stay, the school is however empty.

The school also has a classroom, where we will spend many of our lectures, a small 'tea-kitchen', common areas and a cafeteria, where we can eat our food (but unfortunately *not* prepare it).

SLEEP

You will be sleeping in rooms of two, shared bathrooms in the hallway. You will be provided with sheets and linens.

But you must bring your own towel!

CLEANING DUTIES

We are responsible for cleaning our rooms and common areas at our departure, i.e. tidy up and vacuum. Please keep your rooms and common areas nice and tidy throughout our stay - clean up after yourselves, help each other.

ALCOHOL

Alcohol is strictly forbidden at the Fólkaháskúli.

In addition, alcohol on the Faroe Islands is not sold in supermarkets, but rather in specific liquor stores, bars, and pubs (the latter two being more expensive).

FOOD - TO YOYO OR NOT TO YOYO

Some meals will be provided by Humanity in Action, either at the Fólkaháskúli or in other locations. For some meals *you are on your on* = YOYO-meals.

Breakfast will be served every morning at the Fólkaháskúli.

Some lunches will be YOYO-lunches, you will have to pay for them yourselves, others will be provided by HIA.

For dinner, we will either eat together, or you will receive a small subsidy to buy dinner yourself.

The Nordic House & "Skál"

The Nordic House is run as a Nordic institution of art and culture with a diverse programme of music, literature, theatre, film, visual arts, lectures, conferences and much more. We will visit the Nordic House on our very first day to watch the new Faroese documentary "Skál", which was the audience's favorite at this year's CPH DOX film festival.

The Aula

Our two-day seminar on August 26 and 27 will take place at the Aula. It's an aula at an old school in Tórshavn. Nowadays it is usually used for concerts because of its unique acoustics. The room is decorated with art by the international acknowlegded Faroese writer William Heinesen and his son, the Faroese painter Zacharias Heinesen, whose paintings have formed a school in Faroese visual arts.



Amnesty International Føroya

On Tuesday we will visit Amnesty and learn about the work they do in the Faroe Islands.





Listasavn Føroya

The National Gallery of the Faroe Islands, just a 10 min.'s walk from the city centre. It's the Faroe Islands' main museum for Faroese art. The collection consists of approx. 2,500 works, primarily paintings, here you will find the magnificent Faroese nature and the peculiar landscape converted into pictures. The museum also has graphics, sculptures, installations and textiles. Among the main works in the art museum's collection you will find a large installation made of glass that you can go into, and here get the experience of floating in the middle of the sea. Optically you can see 700 meters up and down. Get ready for a dizzying art experience that can challenge your fear of heights.

COVID-19 REGULATIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

TESTING UPON AND AFTER ARRIVAL

It is your own responsibility to make sure you have the proper documenations regarding corona vaccination proof and/or proof of a negative corona test, in order to be able to travel to the Faroe Islands!

It's recommened that you get a test 3 days prior to departure.

A mandatory test will also be administered immediately upon arrival. It's recommended to stay home/isolated until the result is available.

On our fourth day we will have a new test. The Faroe Islands have several free testing sites, where we will be obtaining this second test.

GENERAL HIA GUIDELINES

Please observe during our fellowship for the safety of everyone

Wash hands regularly and use hand sanitizer.

Avoid big crowds and gatherings, especially until the test result from the second test is available. This also means pubs etc.

Wear a mask on public transportation, especially when standing.

Keep a safe distance, at least two meters, between you and others.

If you feel sick, stay at home and notify us immediately.

Get tested regularly, preferably once-twice a week.

Limit contact with people outside of our circle.

BJARNI KÁRASON PETERSEN

Member of the Faroese parliament for the party Framsókn, and member of the board of Framsókn

Bjarni Kárason Petersen is a member of the Faroese Parliament, the Løgtingið, for the party Framsökn and a member of their board. Framsókn is a classicla liberal party that among other things - works for independence from Denmark.

BRANDUR MORTENSEN NOLSØE

Sociologist and Project Assistant at Unicef, 2018 Humanity in Action Fellow and Humanity in Action Denmark board member

Brandur Mortensen Nolsøe has an academic background in Sociology with a focus on everyday identity work and social interaction. Having grown up in the Faroe Islands, Brandur is engaged in cultural barriers among ethnic groups and the interrelations within the union of Denmark, Greenland and the Faroe Islands. Brandur is currently on paternity leave.

HEINI Í SKORINI

Assistant Professor at the University of the Faroe Islands

Heini Skorini holds a Ph.D. degree in International Relations from King's College London, Department of War Studies. His main research areas include international relations and human rights, religion and secularization, freedom of expression and censorship. Another research interest includes popular attitudes to scientific issues, public trust in scientific authorities, and what factors contribute to anti-scientific attitudes, polarization, and distrust in science.

HERVØR PÁLSDÓTTIR

Member of the Faroese Parliament for the party Tjóðveldi

Hervør Pálsdóttir is a member of parliament in the Faroe Islands for the party Tjóðveldi, a left-wing political party committed to Faroese independence. Hervør graduated from The University of the Faroe Islands in 2019 with a degree in Politics and Administration. In 2017 she began working with the Faroese Pro-choice movement Frítt Val, where she still works to this day.

HØGNI HOYDAL

Political leader of the Faroese party Tjóðveldi, former minister and reporter

Høgni Hoydal is a Faroese politician who served as the Minister of Fisheries and Deputy Prime Minister from 2015 to 2019. He was a reporter on a Faroese national television station prior to his election to parliament in 1998. Høgni Hoydal has been the party leader of Tjóðveldi since 1998. In 2001, 2005 and 2007 he was elected as one of two Faroese members of the Danish Folketing. He is married and has three children.

INGILÍN DIDRIKSEN STRØM

Member of the Faroese Parliament for the party Javnaðarflokkurin

Ingelín Didriksen Strøm is a member of the Faroese Løgtingið for the party Javnaðarflokkurin, which is the Faroese Social Democratic Party.

KATRIN Á NEYSTABØ

National Director at Amnesty International Føroyar

Katrin á Neystabø is the director of Amnesty International in the Faroe Islands. She started as a campaigner for Amnesty International in 2010 and became director in 2014. During the last few years, the Faroese Amnesty office has worked extensively in the field of violence against women, rape and consent, isolation in detention, LGBT+ rights as well as refugee rights. She holds a cand. merc. degree in marketing and organization from Aarhus School of Business.

RANDI SAMSONSEN

Danish textile artist and designer

Randi Samsonsen is a Faroese textile artist and designer. Randi graduated from 'Designskolen' in Kolding as a Master of Design in 2012. With a current focus on art as a medium for change, Samsonsen has been collecting plastic gloves with the aim of drawing attention to human patterns of consumption.

RUNA PREETI ISFELD

PhD in Social Sceince

IRuna Preeti Isfeld has written the PhD "Marriage Migrants to the Faroe Islands: An Analysis of the Life-World of Non-Western Women Married to the Faroe Islands" from Aalborg University (2019).

SJÚRÐUR SKAALE

Member of the Danish Parliament for Javnaðarflokkurin

Sjúrður Skaale, is a social-democratic politician who has represented The Faroe Islands in the Danish Parliament for nine years. Before that, he was a member of the Faroese Parliament for four years. He has also worked as a journalist, a teacher and has been self-employed.

SONJA JÓGVANSDÓTTIR

Faroese journalist and politician

Sonja J. Jógvansdóttir is a Faroese journalist, politician, and founder of Samtak, a Faroese trade union center. She also coestablished LGBT Faroe Islands in 2011, and was a member of the Social Democratic Party until 2015. When she was elected to the party, she became the first openly gay elected to the Faroese parliament. Following her departure from the party, she remains an independent politician in the parliament.

STEFFAN KLEIN POULSEN

Member of the Faroese Parliament for the party Miðflokkurin

Steffa Klein Poulsen

Steffan Klein Poulsen is 25 years old and lives in a small village called Hvannasund in the northern region of the Faroe Islands. He is raised in a Christian family and has personally chosen to follow Jesus. Today he is a member of the Faroese Parliament, Løgtingið, for the party Miðflokkurin, and studies economics. Miðflokkurin, the Centre Party, is a Christian-democratic, conservative political party. Steffan has a broad interest for sports and rules. He is active in his church. In the parliament he is a member of the Law committee (Rættarnevndin) and a member of the West Nordic Council. On a political level his focus points have been defending the traditional and fundamental values such as marriage between man and woman and the right to life of the unborn. He has personally pointed the tabooed subject pornography out as a society problem. Overall, it lies deep in Steffan's heart to keep Faroe Islands on a traditional path.

Faroese and writes about applied ethics for Dimmalætting, a Faroese newspaper. Growing up in the so-called Danish "Community of the Realm", Tór has always been attuned to issues of cultural, social and political minority rights and the practical and theoretical challenges these pose. His studies have focused on the political philosophy of nationalism and the right to self-determination, and in the future, Tór hopes to further study the dynamics of nationalism and secession in the Acrtic Region.

TURIÐ MARIA JÓHANSDÓTTIR

Founder of Fritt Val

Turið Maria Jóhansdóttir is chairperson at Amnesty International Faroe Islands and board member and initiator at Frítt Val, an orgnization working for free abortion on The Faroe Islands.

TÓR MARNI WEIHE

President of the Faroese National Union of Students and 2020 Humanity in Action Fellow

Tór Marni Weihe, a native of the Faroese capital of Tórshavn, is currently pursuing a double major in Applied Philosophy and Russian Language and Culture at the University of Aalborg and Copenhagen University in Denmark. From a young age, Tór has been engaged in student politics and currently serves as President of the Faroese National Union of Students and is also an observer Board Member of the European Students' Union.
