>> Trust the Process, Begin Anywhere: A Tool Kit for Creative Practice and Cultural Collaboration

Marissa Schneiderman & Michelle Shofet (Humanity in Action Senior Fellows)

In 2016, Michelle Shofet and Marissa Schneiderman sewed the seeds for their alternative "guidebook" on Jewish culture in contemporary Poland. Using methodologies such as field recording, visual documentation, oral history and etching, they created a multimedia art piece entitled, *Żyd: An Index of Encounters*—a work intended to foster empathy and connectivity across cultures. The intention of this workshop is to inspire and inform others on how to implement into their own projects a variety of research methodologies designed to enrich any topic of exploration.

>> SIGN — A Live-Action Roleplaying Game About How Deaf Children in Nicaragua Created their Own Sign Language — and What We Can Learn From Such Games About Preparing the Ground for Human Rights Discussions

SIGN is an award-winning freeform larp, a live-action roleplaying game. We will go through a personal and emotional experience by roleplaying deaf kids in 1977 Nicaragua, embedded in a prepared, respectful and safe space. After the game, we use the momentum of this shared experience for a broader discussion on the role of emotional game design in human rights discussions.

In this workshop, participants will look at this US civil rights movements with fresh eyes and learn the basic steps towards organizing sustainable change in the face of injustice. Keynote Speakers

Dr. Andreas Eberhardt

CEO, Foundation Remembrance, Responsibility and Future“ (Foundation EVZ)

Dr. Andreas Eberhardt has been Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Foundation Remembrance, Responsibility and Future (EVZ) since April 2016. The active shaping of a culture of memory, the promotion of democratic civil society in Europe, and the strengthening of international understanding are central to his work. Eberhardt studied Sociology, Political Science, Journalism, and Communications (M.A.). He received his doctorate from the University of Münster with a thesis on the processing of captivity and imprisonment in camps, and did research on prisoners' literature, biographical narratives, and on addressing experiences of persecution. He is a member of the Advisory Council on the Alliance for Democracy and Tolerance – against Extremism and Violence, founded by the Federal Ministries of the Interior and Justice, and also of the Advisory Council of the Foundation Brandenburgische Gedenkstätten.



Konstanty Gebert

International Reporter and Columnist at Gazeta Wyborcza

Konstanty Gebert is an Associate Fellow at the European Council for Foreign Relations and an international reporter and columnist at Gazeta Wyborcza, Poland's largest daily publication. During the 1970s, he was a democratic opposition activist and organizer of the Jewish Flying University; while in the 1980s, under martial law, he was an underground journalist. He covered the Bosnian War between 1992 and 1995 for Polish and international media. He is the co-founder of the Polish Council of Christians and Jews and the founder of Midrasz, a monthly Polish Jewish intellectual publication. Konstanty Gebert serves as a board member for Paideia in Stockholm; for the Einstein Forum in Potsdam and for the Advisory Board of the Dutch Jewish Humanitarian Fund in Amsterdam. He has taught across Poland, Israel and the United States. He has authored ten books that examine topics such as the Polish democratic transformation, French policy toward Poland, the Yugoslav wars, the wars of Israel, Torah commentary and post-war Polish Jewry. His essays have appeared in two dozen publications in Poland and abroad, and his articles have been featured in newspapers around the world.

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Dr. Judith S. Goldstein

Founder and Executive Director, Humanity in Action, Inc.

Dr. Judith S. Goldstein founded Humanity in Action in 1998 and has served as its Executive Director ever since. Under Goldstein's leadership, Humanity in Action has organized educational programs on international affairs, diversity and human rights in Bosnia and Herzegovina, Denmark, France, Germany, Poland, the Netherlands, and the United States. She received her PhD in History from Columbia University and was a Woodrow Wilson Scholar for her M.A. studies. Goldstein has written several books and articles on European and American history, art, and landscape architecture. She is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and several boards and advisory groups.

**Deborah Krieg**

Deputy Director, Anne Frank Educational Center

Deborah Krieg studied History in Frankfurt/Main. Since then she has worked at the *Bildungszentrum Anne Frank (Anne Frank Educational Center)* in various positions — as Board Member, freelancer and educator. In 2013, Deborah became the Deputy Director of the Center. Her work focuses on counseling in post-migrant societies, civic and historical learning. She curated the exhibition „Anne Frank. Tomorrow more”.

Zuzanna Radzik

Theologian, Publicist and Blogger

Zuzanna Radzik is Vice President of the Forum For Dialogue, an organization dedicated to inspiring new connections between contemporary Poland and the Jewish people. She deals with Christian-Jewish dialogue and feminist theology. Zuzanna studied Catholic Theology at the Pontifical Faculty of Theology in Warsaw (MA & STL) and Religious Studies at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem (MA). She specializes in Christian-Jewish relations. Since 2003 she has been contributing to the Catholic weekly „Tygodnik Powszechny”, where she writes in areas of faith, Christian-Jewish relations, Judaism, Polish-Jewish issues and Catholic feminism. Her blog “Jews & Witches” is available on the weekly's platform. In 2015 she published a book about feminist efforts in the Catholic Church.

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Workshop Trainers

Tara Dickman is a community organizer, strategy consultant and trainer specialized in inclusion and social justice. She is a Humanity in Action Senior Fellow from 2007. Tara was trained in organizing in Chicago in 2010 and has lead several local and national campaigns since. From 2010 to 2016, she organized a nationwide campaign against racial profiling in France involving several Humanity in Action Senior Fellows. The campaign resulted in France being found guilty of racial discrimination and several bills presented in the French Parliament on collecting data on stop and search practices. Today, with her non-profit organization Le Next Level, Tara is a strategist and a community organizer for projects fostering equal rights and opportunities and social cohesion. She is also a certified civil servant trainer on inclusive management, discrimination, and the implications of secularism in the workplace.



Yonatan Miller (he/him) is an activist turned technologist from New York. He moved to Berlin in 2015 and is involved with social movements in *the streets* and *the tweets*. He is a software developer and co-founded the Berlin Tech Workers Coalition. Gerrit Reininghaus is active in analogue game design and is using games as empowerment tools. Gerrit holds a Master in Mathematics and Philosophy and a Master in Public Administration /Policy. He has worked for several years in international management consultancy in the financial services industry, was CEO of a software cooperative and has spent the last years with his family in rural Guatemala. He is a board member of the *Archiv der Jugendkulturen* (*Archive of Youth Cultures*) and of the local Social Democratic Party division in Bonn. 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Linnea Riensberg works as process designer, facilitator, and coach for non-profits and political organizations. While at university studying Journalism, Communications, and Philosophy, she developed political and historical participation and media projects for youth and produced pieces for print media and broadcasting. After completing her degree, Linnea first worked with digital human rights under an Italian representative in the European Parliament and later at *Digitale Gesellschaft e.V.* Linnea is a board member of Humanity in Action Germany and a Senior Fellow of the Berlin Fellowship in 2011.

Marissa Sophia Schneiderman is a writer, artist, oral historian, and radio producer living in Maine. She was raised in an inter-generational and multicultural household in Los Angeles, which led to a love of diverse voices and stories. Michelle Shofet is co-founder of Nocturnal Medicine—an art and design studio that creates experiences, spaces & media for working through the social & emotional challenges of radical environmental change. She earned her Masters in Landscape Architecture from the Harvard Graduate School of Design and approaches her research through the lens of the built environment. Michelle is based in New York City. She is a Humanity in Action Senior Fellow from 2011.

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Pearl Zare is a performance artist presently located in Las Vegas, NV. Her current focus is on using various creative media and narrative games specifically to explore themes of grief and trauma. Antisemitism is one of the topics on which she has been independently focusing as the granddaughter of Holocaust survivors, including her maternal grandfather, who escaped Auschwitz to become the cantor at what was then the only Jewish temple in Las Vegas. His love of music inspired Pearl, and she considers her career as a performer and her work fighting Antisemitism to be a part of carrying on his legacy.
